- (a) Describe the physical features of the KhoiKhoi. [3]
- (b) Explain why land was important for these first inhabitants of Southern Africa. [5]
- (c) Swazi puberty rites were similar to the San puberty rites. How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer giving both sides of the statement. [7]

- (c) "Moshoeshoe was a good leader and loved peace". How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer giving both sides of the argument. [7]

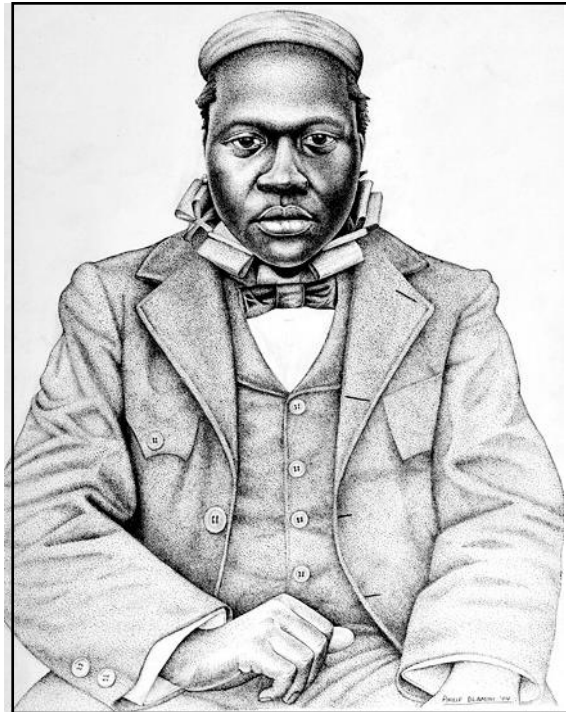
